The Start



- In 2013 the Los Altos Community Foundation (LACF) launched the Los Altos PREPARE Initiative with the objective to:
 - Stimulate emergency preparedness in our community
 - Engage residents
 - Partner with emergency response agencies
 - Collaborate with other stakeholders
- In January 2015 LACF approached City Council about evaluating preparedness activities in Los Altos



The Start

- City Council's 2015 goal of promoting effective government included: *"identify opportunities to enhance collaboration with regards to emergency preparedness"*
- June 23, 2015 Council received a staff report on the status of emergency preparedness and directed staff accordingly
- Next steps identified in report community focused or administrative in nature



Next Steps – CERT



- SCCFD assumed responsibility for emergency community education and CERT volunteer training
- Current Los Altos CERT members are integrated into the process for the mutual benefit of the city and training personnel
- The new model ensures consistency of training and ongoing training efforts, available to residents within the SCCFD jurisdiction
- SCCFD initiated CERT refresher training program in 2017 for CERTs to keep their knowledge and skills up-to-date





Next Step – Appropriation of \$15K For Emergency Preparedness Related Items

FY 15 & 16 funds were utilized to establish a cache of supplies to be used by trained community volunteers in the event of an emergency.

Purpose: To develop a plan and establish goals for Community emergency preparedness

Community Involvement



BATs – take care of their neighborhoods

Hams – set up and operate communication systems



Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) – assist in neighborhoods and be a resource for the City



Community Emergency Response Team

- CERT classes teach residents to prepare for and respond to life-threatening events in their community
- CERT members can mobilize neighborhood resources to:
 - Help BATs organize the neighborhood response
 - Deliver immediate assistance to victims
 - Provide support to the professional first responders
- SCCFD conducts training classes
 – covering fire safety, light search & rescue, team organization (ICS) and disaster first-aid

HAMS







- Hams have been active in Los Altos and emergency communications for over 50 years
- Provide communications capability between neighborhood communication sites (EIRS) and the City's Emergency Operation Center
- Also provide communications for LASD District office and the high school
- Works with neighboring cities and County OES to ensure seamless communications capabilities



Block Action Team (BAT) Program

- Block Action Teams neighbors working with neighbors to build a stronger community
- Program to help neighborhoods facilitate self-connections and help each other in times of need
- In an emergency, BATs will organize their neighborhoods and gather information which is shared with the EOC, allowing the city to allocate resources intelligently
- BATs have fun, too block parties, National Night Out, etc.



Block Action Team (BAT) Program

BAT Training class covers:

- Limited resources available in a major disaster
- Description of Personal Emergency Preparedness (PEP) Class and upcoming training dates
- How to sign up for Nixle and AlertSCC
- Neighborhood Watch what it is and how to set up
- Use of the Help/OK Placards
- How to assess damage and prepare Preliminary Safety Assessment Report
- Never to attempt anything they are not trained for

Progress

BATs

- 199 residents trained
- 61 BATs mapped (<u>www.losaltosbat.org</u>)
- 15.5% of Los Altos Households included in a BAT

CERTs

- Program restarted by volunteers in 2014
- 95 active and trained CERTS

Hams


- Collaboration with SCCFD to staff fire department locations during major emergencies
- Built 8 packet radio systems from community donations to be used at Emergency Information Sites

Progress

Drills and Education

- 2015 Community participated in the City's EOC Drill
- 2016 three neighborhoods had drills sent info into City's EOC during their annual emergency training
- June 13, 2017 60 BAT/Hams/Certs trained in Hands-on CPR, choking and AED taught by SCCFD
- June 17, 2017 Joint Ham/CERT/BAT drill at Grant Park

Putting it Together During an Emergency/Disaster





The Challenge During an Emergency/Disaster

- City needs to allocate scarce professional resources (Police, Fire, Medical) where they can do the most good for the public
- Resource Allocations are based on information available, even if it is incomplete
- City resources spend first moments on information gathering





The Vision During an Emergency/Disaster


- BATs perform a "Preliminary Safety Assessment" (PSA) of their neighborhood
- Information is recorded and sent to closest "Emergency Information Reporting Site (EIRS)
- Ham Radio operators will send the information to the City's Emergency Operation Center (EOC)
- Results:
 - City has more information for decision-making purposes
 - Trained volunteers can share their resources where available



How it Fits Together During and Emergency/Disaster









Summary

- Getting and staying prepared is a "process" not an "event"
- It is not "if" but "when" we will have a major earthquake in the Bay Area

- Initiate a Neighborhood Grant Program to encourage emergency preparedness and connectivity
- Further develop the Stakeholder Team involvement and actions
