Resilient Los Altos



Resilient Los Altos helps build strong Los Altos neighborhoods and provides them with the knowledge, training and communications to prepare, respond and recover from disasters.



Block Action Teams (BATs) have trained and exercised to know their neighbors, to support each other by sharing resources and to be able to report the status of their neighborhoods to the City.



Community Emergency
Response Team (CERT)
members have trained and
practiced to provide disaster
medical services, light search
and rescue techniques,
damage assessment and
hazard evaluation.



Amateur Radio Operators (hams) have trained and exercised to communicate when other communication systems fail. Hams are the voice of the community informing the City where the problems are and aren't.

City of Los Altos

- The City of Los Altos has assembled a team of professionals including police, public works, City staff and County Fire.
- They take care of us every day as we experience automobile accidents, injuries, unexpected fires, downed trees, stopped up sewers and other local emergencies.
- When our local resources are stretched too thin, the City can get mutual aid from surrounding jurisdictions.

However, events can and have occurred that can overwhelm our City's resources to respond.


It doesn't happen often but it can at any time.


Emergency Operations Plan

- Additional planning, resources, and support will be needed to support people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs

- Sign up for emergency alerts.
- Sign up for the RLA newsletter.
- Prepare a family emergency communication plan.
- Does someone in your neighborhood need a HELP/OK sign?
- Meet your neighbors and talk about dealing with disruption.
- Learn some skills to deal with disruptions.
- Take a class from RLA (Zoom and in-person).
- Take a class from SCCFD.
- Become a CERT.
- Learn how to use a radio GMRS or ham.
- Form a Block Action Team in your neighborhood.
- Join Resilient Los Altos. Ask someone in a vest tonight.

Mitigate

- Take actions to reduce the impact of the event
- Zone Zero
- Weed abatement and dead tree removal
- Encourage neighbors
- Store valuable documents in the cloud or remotely
- Take a video household inventory


