



Bunnies and Bonnets Storytimes



Our Children's Librarians planned a week filled with storytimes featuring books about bunnies and creative bonnet crafts.

Dr. Seuss Science Exploration



Children ages 4 and up celebrated Dr. Seuss's birthday while exploring science. They created and tested string phones like in "One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish," examined microscopic friends just like Horton in "Horton Hears a Who," created a kite like Thing 1 and Thing 2 in "The Cat and The Hat" and much more. The children enjoyed the hands-on activities while discovering the science behind the wacky world of Seuss.

Silicon Valley Reads Wrap-up





Children - The Cool Kids Read Book Club focused on the book "The Secret Life of Lincoln Jones." We had 15 children participate. For "Mango, Abuela, and Me" we had family themed storytimes in February and March. For all the storytimes, we had a total of 385 children and caregivers participate.

Teen - This year Teen Silicon Valley Reads programs focused on self-care. Teens deal with a lot of pressure in their lives, and the programs offered techniques to calm and care for oneself, along with strategies on how to deal with stress as it occurs. Teens learned about how mindfulness, meditation, positive talk and thoughts, and journaling could benefit them in their everyday lives. Attendance ranged between 6 - 15 teens.

Adult - The quality of speakers was good. Audience was generally small and intimate but the engagement and feedback was very good. Attendance at the main author event with Mark Lukach and Jeff Bell was 52 on a Friday evening during the Olympics. Total attendance at the other five adult programs was 56, so the average attendance was about 11 adults.

Programs for Adults



Participants joined us for Book Publishing 1-2-3, intended to empower and inspire writers of all ages, including a peek at book publishing, tips for finding agents, and practical promotion ideas.

Arvind Ven, a financial advisor and columnist for the Los Altos Town Crier, discussed the importance of understanding Social Security benefits and strategies when planning the next phase of life, retirement.
